## Biographical/Historical Note

John Inglis was a merchant in Savannah; S.H. Jenkins was his London partner. He was a commissioner of roads for St. Andrews Parish (now McIntosh County) in 1772. Because of his status as a Loyalist, he was named in the Georgia Act of Attainder in 1778, and the firm's lot, wharf, and stores were confiscated.

The collection consists of a letter from S.H. Jenkins to John Inglis, regarding business and the current state of affairs in Georgia and America, as well as a bill of lading for 73 casks of sago powder.
