James Longstreet Sibley Jennings, Jr. is an architect who resides in Alexandria, Virginia and whose family has a long history in Milledgeville, Georgia.

Powell, 1760; account of Benjamin Stirk, 8 October 1771; Thomas Savage to James Read, 1 July 1774; Thomas Washington to John Houston, 2 September 1784; William LeConte to Joseph Clay, 14 April 1785; Jonathan Cuthbert to George Threadcraft, 8 July 1786; Will Stephens to George Jones, 12 August 1786; John Baker to John McIntosh, Jr., 6 February 1788; James Hamilton to Charles Harris, 25 January 1806; A. Cuthbert to David B. Mitchell, June 1809; Articles of agreement between George F. Palmer, John Davidson, and Oliver Palmer, 24 November 1815; Bolling Hall to David B. Mitchell 6 December 1815; Edward Harden to J. L. Spencer, 22 February 1843; and William T. Gould to S. Greenleaf, 30 June 1846.
